

#### **Small Tree Choices**

(under 25' tall at maturity)

- 1. Crabapple
- 2. Serviceberry

#### Medium Tree Choices

(between 25-50' tall at maturity)

- 1. Ohio buckeye
- 2. Sunburst Honeylocust

### Large Tree Choices

(over 50' tall at maturity)


- 1. Black Gum
- 2. American Elm

















- Size: Small tree (about 20' in height)
- Flowers: Showy, dark pink to white to red flowers
- Leaves: Range of foliage colors, ranging from dark green to red depending on the season











Serviceberry (Amelanchier x grandiflora)







- Size: Small tree (about 20'-25' in height)
- Flowers: Clusters of showy, fragrant white flowers
- Leaves: Blue-green leaves















## Sunburst Honeylocust

(Gleditsia triacanthos 'Sunburst')

- Size: Large tree (35'-50' at mature height)
- Flowers: Inconspicuous green flowers
- Leaves: Bright sunny yellow tiny leaflets that emerge in the spring and turn nicely green through the summer.









## Ohio buckeye

(Aesculus glabra)

- Size: Medium tree (20'- 40' at mature height)
- Flowers: Showy, yellow flowers
- Leaves: Bright green large leaves that emerge in spring that mature to dark green in fall

Considerations: all parts of plant are toxic if ingested so please watch small children and pets if planting in your yard






















## Black Gum or Tupelo (Nyssa sylvatica)

- Size: Medium tree (30-50' in height)
- Flowers: greenish-white flowers appear in
  April May during leaf set, and while not showy, serve as an important source of nectar for pollinators















# American Elm (*Ulmus americana*)

'Princeton', 'Valley Forge', 'Jefferson, 'New Harmony'

Will be one of the following cultivars or another Dutch Elm Disease resistant selection

- Size: Large tree (60-80' mature height)
- Flowers: Insignificant small green flowers appear in spring before the foliage emerges
- Leaves: Rough-textured, ovate-elliptic, dark green leaves with toothed margins and asymmetrical bases
